In a lead gift on April 19, 2019, to the Home of Philanthropy's capital campaign, The Cecilian Bank became the Presenting Sponsor.



# PNC MUSIC GARDEN LATEST LEARN-TO-PLAY INITIATIVE

Learning is music to our ears and, with the addition of the PNC Music Garden at the Home of Philanthropy, we hear that sweet melody almost daily.

"The kids love it," Susan Turner said. "When we go to the library, they ask, 'Do we get to go to the music place?'"

Susan brought her grandson Brock Turner, 12, and greatgrandchildren Emma Downs, 3, and Carson Downs, 1, to play at the music garden and participate in Hardin County Public Library children programming. She said she likes how the music garden appeals to children of all ages.

"I like that all the kids can play here," she said. "It's a great thing."

The learning-through-play experience is thanks to a nearly \$50,000 grant to Central Kentucky Community Foundation. The PNC Music Garden includes multiple colorful musical instruments and art features in a fully accessible space where art, music and nature come together in perfect harmony.

"I like the big drums because it makes lots of noise," Emma said.

Donna Fohl's 17-month-old grandson Duke was bouncing between the instruments at the Music Garden. She said Duke also took interest in the drums.

"You have exposure to music, play, reading and books all in one location," she said about the Music Garden's proximity to the Hardin County Public Library. "Developmentally, it's what they need, and it's free."





#### GET READY! CAMP HELPS CHILDREN LEARN THROUGH PLAY

In its eighth consecutive year, Get Ready! Camp hosted a record-setting 3,200 children in five sessions at four locations.

"We love coming to Get Ready! Camp," said Katelyn Tabb who brings her daughter Olivia. "I just love the social part of it. She gets to be with friends and learn songs and do crafts that I don't have time to do with her at home."

Get Ready! Camp helps prepare children from birth to age 5 for success in school and life through learn-through-play activities. Campers attended either in the morning or afternoon at one of our five sessions at four locations in Hardin County. The camp is free and held each year throughout the month of June.

# PARTNERSHIPS LEAD TO MANY OPPORTUNITIES

With the completion of the Home of Philanthropy (Page 2) and so much of our work focused on making the community - our home - a better place, it only seemed fitting that the theme for Celebrating Community Philanthropy would be home.

We heard from donors and community members about how they are making their piece of home better through partnerships with CKCF. Dr. Robert "Bob" Jackson shared how he and his siblings are preserving a piece of history through the Harold and Dolly Jackson Endowment Fund for Magnolia Cemetery, a fund in memory of their parents.

"I'm fortunate to have grown up in this region. We were taught to always give back more than you take," he said. "And this is a way to give back to our home.

"I hope it shows others a way where we need to take care of our history, our geneology, and the community's investments," he added.

For people involved with St. James Catholic School and Parish, making home a better place for their students and members meant exploring multiple opportunities with Central Kentucky Community Foundation and with that came opportunity.

CKCF opened many doors for funding opportunities for St. James, according to Jennifer Moran.

"We've worked with CKCF on several funds over the past couple of years, not just for the school but for the parish as well," she said, adding that some funds are endowed to help students and the parish forever.

In the past year, St. James has started an endowment fund for the parish and a scholarship fund for students.

Moran also spoke of other funding opportunities, including Ky. Gives Day (Page 9) that allowed the school to purchase musical

instruments for students to play and a school security system.

Another fund, the Tai Sy Le Memorial Fund created by Tai's parents, supports annual service projects for St. James students.

"We felt with gifts in Tai's memory, that something toward community service just felt right," said Dr. Tao Le, Tai's father. "We've been really fortunate and appreciate the help developing a fund to support future service projects that would allow students at St. James to learn about service and how that ties into the community."

Scott and Monica Kisselbaugh had a desire to enhance the lives of students in our community and wanted to carry on the legacy of a family friend. To accomplish both of these goals, they started a scholarship fund with CKCF through the Endow Kentucky tax credit program.

"We were looking for a way to honor a family friend, PFC Sammie Phillips, who lost his life

in the War on Terror," said Scott. "By establishing an endowed scholarship in his name, we are able to carry on his legacy forever."



"What is good about Endow Kentucky is not only does it honor Sammie and preserve his legacy, but the program is good all around," he added. "It's good for us the donor, it's good for the community and it's good for CKCF."

Scott, who is a CPA and is familiar with the benefits of the Endow Kentucky program, advises clients to take advantage of the tax credit in their giving plans.

"There's never been a better time for donors in Kentucky and, as a CPA, I often advise clients to take advantage of the tax credit in their charitable giving," he said. "When they use the Endow

Kentucky tax credit, a gift of \$50,000 roughly can be cut in half after the credit and the federal charitable tax deduction are applied. By doing so, it not only benefits causes they care about, but it also stretches their charitable dollars allowing them to do more for organizations whose missions are important to them.

"And now I practice what I preach," he added. "I can now say Monica and I have established a fund through Endow Kentucky and we're going to keep giving to it. It's now part of our giving plan."



#### YOUR PARTNER IN SCHOLARSHIP ADMINISTRATION

The addition of several community partners to Scholarship Central in 2019 meant more opportunities for students in one place. All scholarships offered through Elizabethtown Community and Technical College in addition to the scholarships CKCF offers for ECTC students, made Scholarship Central essential for ECTC students. 

Hunderds of community members came to The State Theater in Elizabethtown on March 25 for A Night of Remembrance and Understanding to hear Holocaust survivor and Louisville resident Fred Gross speak of how, even during his family's narrow escapes from Hitler's Nazi army, they found love and kindness.

# THE BENJAMIN FUND SPREADS KINDNESS TO ALL

Hundreds filled The State Theater in Elizabethtown to hear a Holocaust survivor's story of how he and his family found love and kindness as they fled from Hitler's Nazi army during A Night of Remembrance and Understanding.

Through a \$2 million gift, the Marvin and Joyce Benjamin Fund strives to foster kindness, understanding and inclusiveness among the diverse people who call our community home. As part of that mission, Fred Gross (pictured above right) came to share his story.

A Jewish child whose family were Belgium refugees in France, Fred took the audience through his family's journey of narrow escapes and luck. He told of how, without the help and compassion of people of other faiths, his family would not have survived.

"Mr. Gross's message is a reminder to all persons of the importance of removing hatred from our personal lives and maintaining an environment of understanding and accountability," Jared Ben-Caro said. "Events like this help reiterate that all human beings are deserving of respect, dignity, liberty and life."

The fund also sponsored an exhibition of Never Again: Murals of the Holocaust at Elizabethtown Community and Technical College's Morrison Gallery for six weeks. The fund also provided support for Hardin County, Elizabethtown Independent, and LaRue County and St. James Catholic schools' and home school students to visit the exhibit and for curriculum to be provided for their teachers. The exhibit was offered free of charge to the community.

"Tolerance and understanding others are traits of a civil society and traits we want to embody as a community," said Davette B. Swiney, CKCF president and CEO. "Helping our students connect the lessons of the Holocaust to today and learning to have open, respectful dialogue is a true lifelong gift from the Benjamins."

# NEVER AGAIN: MURALS OF THE HOLOCAUST

#### **WOMEN STEPPING UP**

In a year where Heels Together, our women-led initiative, celebrated its fifth year, we have even more cause for celebration than just our anniversary.

Hosting the banquet in the Home of Philanthropy, we reached 50 investors for the first time and awarded \$25,000 in grants.

"You could definitely feel the energy in the room," said Teri Bennett, an original Heels Together Investor. "We had much to celebrate, but topping that list was the \$110,000 in grants we've awarded in five years to new programming to benefit women and girls in Hardin County."

At the Investors' Banquet, women heard stories from the Community Health Clinic (pictured left top) and Warm Blessings (pictured left middle) about how their 2018 grants impacted women's lives. The Community Health Clinic's Women's Health Initiative was able to provide clinical care and advocacy for 486 women and have coordinated and provided 2,023 women's care visits. Warm Blessings was able to provide 598 rides to 54 women to travel to and from work through its Ride to Independence program.

Investors awarded a \$15,000 grant to Elizabethtown Community and Technical College for its Camp Forge Ahead and the Hardin County Attorney's Office was awarded \$10,000 for its Breaking the Silence on Dating Violence program.



#### **BUILDING BETTER** LIVES FOR OTHERS

Heels Together took the initiative's motto to heart when they helped a homeowner build a better life for her and her family.

Heels Together partnered with Hardin County Habitat for Humanity on Sept. 14 for Women Build Day. During the build, the women worked alongside homeowner Whitney Jones to install siding and insulation. They also painted a shed on the property.

"The cornerstone of Heels Together is to help improve the lives of women and girls in Hardin County," said Investor Erin Hahn. "It's all about building women up and what better way to do that than to help another woman build a strong foundation for her family? The collaboration of our group of amazing, strong women working side-by-side with Whitney, sharing stories and laughing was inspiring and fulfilling. We were contributing to help build a foundation for this incredible woman we know will extend further than just the physical structure of her new home."
