Celebrating Community Foundation Week

CKCF started the week of November 15th announcing the recipients of our inaugural Granted program, awarding 14 local nonprofits over \$75,000 (please see "Granted" story on page 3 for more details).

On Wednesday, CKCF hosted a FAFSA workshop in partnership with Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority (KHEAA) offering students one-on-one assistance to complete the FAFSA for college grants and scholarships.

On Thursday, CKCF hosted a virtual nonprofit roundtable for area organizations, giving them the opportunity to discuss how they are positioning their organization to thrive as they continue to serve our community through the pandemic. Nonprofits shared innovative ideas about fundraising for the coming year and discussed hurdles they

are facing with volunteer participation challenges.

The week finished strong hosting a blood drive with the Red Cross in our Community Hall. Over 30 pints of blood were donated. CKCF's next blood drive will be in the spring so watch for details.

Granted awards over \$75,000 to local

Central Kentucky Community
Foundation awarded \$76,439 in grants to fourteen nonprofit organizations through the Granted program.
Granted, a competitive grant program, offers funding opportunities to meet the ever-changing needs of the region.
The November 16th announcement was the conclusion to the inaugural year of the Granted Program.

"Through the generosity of our donors, along with the foresight many years ago of people who gave to this community in a long-term and thoughtful way, we have the opportunity each year to make grant awards in relevant ways to impact our community today," said Davette B. Swiney, President and CEO of Central Kentucky Community Foundation.
